Hot Off The Press: RIF Is Now A 501(c)(3) Nonprofit

In an exciting new chapter of RIF's evolution, the Leadership Committee announces that **The Reading Is Fun Program Inc.** is now a tax-exempt charitable organization, under the Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3).

Since its establishment in 2013, RIF has operated in partnership with the Schenectady City School District Educational Foundation. Effective immediately, RIF is incorporated with 501(c) (3) nonprofit status. With this status, the organization does not pay income taxes related to its nonprofit mission and purposes, is able to receive tax-deductible contributions, and is eligible for foundation grants.

How does it impact RIF? The main differences are (1) that officially RIF is now "The Reading Is Fun Program, Inc." and (2) that as such it is now able to accept donations to deposit in its own bank account, thereby simplifying its financial management to enhance fundraising (especially to attract more grants). To donate, please issue checks to "The Reading Is Fun Program, Inc."

Additionally, in compliance with IRS regulations, RIF has made governance changes, most notably by establishing a Board structure for oversight of RIF policymaking and implementation.

Dr. Al Magid, founder of The Reading is Fun Program, expressed deep gratitude for the long, mutually beneficial relationship RIF had with the Schenectady City School District Educational Foundation. He notes that over the years, the Foundation has been an unstinting supporter of its RIF partner, lending encouragement to RIF to grow and develop in ways that will continue to benefit young readers in the Schenectady City School District. Also, he thanks RIF's leadership team and its evergrowing cohort of volunteer reading mentors who infuse RIF with a spirit of civic engagement in the interest of supporting Schenectady youth.

Where do you volunteer? This is my third year at Van Corlaer Elementary in Grade 1.

Why did you join RIF? I I am a retired Middle School special education teacher. Close friends had encouraged me to look into the RIF program, and I was hooked. What's not to love about a class of exuberant 6-year-olds still excited about school?

How do you make reading fun? Getting to know each student is crucial, so I LOVE the interest inventory concept. I set up an individual folder for my students, including the inventory and book lists, a composition book, stickers & whiteboard. All of these items go home with them in June. We also do a project involving writing. The students complete a 2-4 page "book" of their choice. They are able to bring it home as a gift to their parents.

How do you spend free time? Aerobics/walking with friends, volunteering with some organizations in Schenectady, member of Niskayuna Reformed Church's Mission & Service committee, traveling to see grandchildren and traveling to see the world.

Where do you volunteer? At Paige Elementary School, with a second grader & a third grader.

Why did you get involved with RIF? As the second of six children, I learned early on how to "be" with children, a life-lesson that carried into adulthood. As a child, I wanted to be a Kindergarten teacher. While I never pursued teaching as a career goal (I chose communications), it was what propelled me to start mentoring in 1993, and continue mentoring 30+ years later.

How do you make reading fun? When I was growing up, my dad would use "big words" at the dinner table. When I asked what they mean, he would say "go look them up." So I like to use "big words" with my RIF students. I tell them, "This Is a fifth-grade word & you'll be the only one in your class who knows what it means." I also teach the students some sign language to go along with words they are reading.

What are your other interests? Teaching Junior Achievement (20+yrs), volunteering at Ellis Hospital, ushering at Capital Rep & SLOC, helping in my Congregation Agudat Achim kitchen, & participating with Stars of Honor (American Legion). I also work out several days/week.

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
